

- To help children to develop their own communication skills.
- To be able to provide and understand instructions to give to children and other staff members.
- To accurately fill in children's records and any other information, so that all staff can understand it and no mistakes are made.
- To effectively communicate with all adults including other staff and children's parents/carers.
- Producing reports on children's development, writing newsletters or letters to parents/carers, producing displays, supporting children's literacy.

Without these skills you could be limiting your opportunity to progress in your career.

Play workers who deliver and facilitate play opportunities for children in settings including play groups and play schemes can earn an average of **£18,808**.

Nursery nurses and assistants care for children from birth up to seven years of age can earn an average of **£17,487**.

Higher level roles as child and early years officers who work with babies and with children up to 14 years can earn up to **£25,944**.
