- Navigation calculations need to be accurate, so you can calculate routes and time estimation.
- You need to be clear interpreting co-ordinates of grid references to locate position, calculating angles when setting compass bearings. Navigation is key to all services such as search and rescue and in particular the military as it is one of the core basic training areas.
- Accuracy with statistical analysis and analysis of demographics in relation to setting government policy. Interpreting data/analysis of current issues such as crime figures, voting trends, government spending.
- Fitness testing accuracy for administering and recording test results, data analysis of test results.
- Maths is used in the Navy in relation to the complexities of oceanography.
