

### Health Care and Health Science Uniform & Kit List requirements.

All students studying in the service industries at college will wear a uniform that represents their sector. In healthcare and health science we have consulted with students to make our uniform both individual to students but forms a departmental brand.

Uniforms have been introduced to help students in the Healthcare & Health Science department to meet professional industry standards and the requirements when entering employment.

A basic uniform has been introduced to help students in the Healthcare & Health Science department meet professional industry standards. The purpose of having a uniform is to ensure that all students present themselves in a professional manner that is reflective of the caring sector industries.

Presenting a professional image helps patients & people have trust and confidence in their carer so it is important that students develop the necessary knowledge skills and behaviours to support this. All students will be required to attend placement and as such will be required to dress in a way that projects a professional image.

### Uniform at college

As part of your uniform at college you will need to wear:

- Smart black trousers which can be purchased from any high street store. This can include uncuffed cargo trousers, thick leggings or plain black trousers **BUT DOES NOT INCLUDE:** sports leggings/joggers/shorts/skirts/dresses/patterned clothing.
- Plain white/black/grey top-this can either be capped or long sleeved e.g. polo or crew neck t shirt **BUT DOES NOT INCLUDE:** crop tops, low cut and vest tops.
- Outer wear that can be worn in class can include zip up plain black, white or grey hoodie.
- Smart footwear-Black/white trainers **BUT DOES NOT INCLUDE:** multi-coloured trainers/crocs/UGGS/heels/sandals

### Uniform at placement

#### Introduction to Health, Social Care and Children's and Young People's Settings - Level 1, Extended Diploma in Health and Social Care - Level 2, T Level Foundation Year - Health - Level 2, and Health and Social Care - Level 3

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- Plain white/black/grey top-this can either be capped or long sleeved e.g. polo or crew neck t shirt **BUT DOES NOT INCLUDE:** crop tops, low cut and vest tops.
- Outer wear that can be worn in class can include zip up plain black, white or grey hoodie
- Smart footwear-Black/white trainers **BUT DOES NOT INCLUDE:** multicoloured/trainers/crocs/UGGS/heels/sandals

\* Please note that footwear for placement must be a lace up or slip-on trainer style full shoe with minimal sports branding, have a soft non-slip sole to minimise accidents and **MUST** be black. Trainers must be wipe clean and/or washable. They must be non-porous and be enclosed (no open shoes) and black in colour. Shoes advised are something such as Skechers with an arch fit. Working in the care industry requires long periods of time on your feet so appropriate footwear is crucial to long term health and wellbeing and care of the back.



### T Level (Level 3)

The Clinical scrubs uniform will only be required for T Level students only as these will be worn at the hospital- the information to purchase these will be provided after passing induction

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Please note If you feel that you have any personal/faith/cultural requirements regarding uniform (i.e. the wearing of darkened glasses, adapted clothing to assist with disability, items of jewellery specific to faith) please speak to the Head of Department: Theresa Cope/Chloe Hammond-Programme Area Leader

### Other stationary

Learners will need to arrive at class with stationary as well as be dressed appropriately. It is important that learners are prepared for each lesson before starting their lessons.

Pencil case filled with pens, pencils, highlighters, rubbers, ruler etc.

Notebooks/note paper/folders/dividers

Scientific Calculator (for Maths lessons)

Laptop if learners already own one

The use of mobile phones and earphones will not be allowed in Healthcare and Health Science lessons unless specifically required for a task.

This is primarily to ensure that learners are developing the skills to use their phone less, as in a clinical and care setting staff are not permitted to be on their phones as they are meant to be caring for patients and service users and distracts from learning.

Students will be required to comply with the no phones during lesson and this will be confirmed at the start of term.
