These portable skills go with you from school, apprenticeships, college, university and employment. Take account of your skill set and you'll see how you can apply it to your job search.
- You Can Use Transferable Skills To Land A Job – Transferable skills are a way for you to show that you can do the job, even if you aren't the perfect match of the job description. Transferable skills can highlight your potential to be an asset to a company.
